# Calvary CRC Council Highlights

Council President, Mike Jansen, opened the January Council meeting reading from a text called, "Servant Leadership: A Biblical Devotion". As Christian leaders we are called to serve, be humble, and seek others' counsel. We prayed for the new counsel; for all affected by the Perry school shooting including the shooter's family; for Wilma Ryken's family; and for the lowa caucuses.

The Council thanked Joe Hoksbergen for doing double duty last year as Council President and as Consistory President, filling in for Orville Bultsma.

We are thankful for the many members involved in mission work in Haiti, Abaco, disaster relief and SERVE projects. We are thankful for the praise teams, for the youth leaders who stepped up while Pastor Nate and Caitlin were having a baby, for the many young couples with children, for the faithful service of Arvin & Judy Kelderman, and for the work done to update the Handbook.

We are thankful for meeting over and above the 2023 Calvary budget needs resulting in an extra \$20,000 given to Ministry Shares.

We encourage all members to ask visitors what they thought of the service and encourage them to come again.

Pastor Brad took a one week sabbatical. He read Eugene Peterson's memoir, visited with Mark Quist, a mentor, and George Den Oudstenout; and spent time at the family cabin in Colorado.

The Council has decided to engage Thrive, a ministry of the CRCNA, to help provide the Council with recommendations to consider how Calvary can move forward with clarity around mission, vision, and the possibility of church renewal.

The Council reaffirmed the practice of having a Property Monitor to patrol the church campus during the Sunday morning services. Previously the Property Monitors were elders only, but now will be expanded to include deacons and other church members selected by the deacons. The Property Monitor should move about the building and keep an eye on the parking lots, to assist anyone in need. The Property Monitor should check in on the nursery frequently. The idea is to have a 'watchful eye' on the property. The Property Monitor is not a security guard.

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# **GUATEMALA WINTERIM TRIP 2023-2024**

For most high school winterim trips, plans are made almost a year in advance. This was not quite what happened to me. In September or October I saw in the high school's daily newsletter that there was an opening in the Guatemala trip. I talked to our leader, Libby Brafhaart, about what that might look like if I were to go. After talking to my parents we decided that it would be beneficial and reasonable for me to go on this trip. It felt like it was a very quick process to get all the important information put together. I didn't really know what to expect from this trip, having not traveled out of the country much. So as my family could tell you, I was stressed the night before we left, but everything was well planned and it all went smoothly.

This trip was a wonderful opportunity to fulfill some of my dreams and stoke some of my hope for the future. I have always longed to travel, and get restless if I'm in one place for a long time. I also love to get to know people and please them in whatever way I can. This trip allowed me to see some of our wonderful world and to get to know people who are so different from us. In a way this trip was eye opening and heartbreaking. Having spent the vast majority of my life in the U.S., I have become accustomed to the leisurely, fast paced, demanding life that we as Americans lead. In Guatemala it was so different from anything I have ever known. The people there are clearly less privileged than even the least privileged in Pella. Yet the people with whom we interacted held more joy and peace than most of us combined. They were content with the simplest of lives. Lilian was the seven year old girl that my group got to build a house for. Her family was living in a tent and the only toys she had were three Barbies and one dress for all three. It was sad for me who had more than 10 times what she has. We brought some toys, coloring books, playdough and the sort with us to

give to her once the house was done. Another thing that really stood out to me was how grateful they all were for what we did. It felt small and insignificant to me but it was life changing for them.

All of this was very important to me but what really touched me and stood out the most was when the mother said, "I'll see you soon" on our last day. Chances are I will never see them again on this earth, but she reminded me that we will meet again one day beneath that unfading light of the Lord. The people on this trip blessed me and brought me closer to God more than I could ever have imagined.
